The Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe had to wait 88 years for a reservation or any compensation for the lands they had ceded. Still, by standing their ground, they were able to remain united near their original ancestral lands, located on the tip of the Kitsap Peninsula near Hansville. Plants played an important role in the lives of tribal members, and still do, for sustenance, medicine, and household items. Port Gamble S'Klallam People are bridging the cultural connections of yesterday and today and providing a link for protecting Pacific Northwest plants and natural habitats in the future.
